STS'AILES REFERENDUM VOTE INFO

VOTING DAY HAS BEEN SET: March 20th, 2024

As we move forward, in the coming months we will be doing our best to prepare you for this important referendum. In our worldview, we live and breathe sustainability and resilience, which encompasses the teachings of seven generations. This teaching conveys the need to consider the impacts on one another, our environment, and for those who are yet to come - the four legged, the plant and root people, the ones that swim in the rivers and oceans, the ones that fly, and the weakest beings, the human.

A milestone of Sts'ailes is to have our Snowoyelh (traditional laws) recognized and threaded into our governing practices. The Constitution & Citizenship Code are two big pieces of becoming self-governed, stepping out of the Indian Act, and working towards our CCP goal!

Sts'ailes CCP Exerpt:

"WHAT WE ENVISION: Sts'ailes governance, constitution, authority, and responsibility are established by membership (Citizenship) and recognized by other First Nations and other governments at the national, provincial, and local levels. Sts'ailes has its own system of laws and enforcement along with a restorative justice system. With self government, Sts'ailes has a full suite of policies to guide each sector of each department."

WHAT IS A CONSTITUTION?

The Constitution describes how we wish to live and how we want to govern ourselves. It is the over-arching document for our laws.

WHAT IS A CITIZENSHIP CODE?

The Citizenship Code determines who Sts'ailes government will respond to, advocate for, and govern.

WHAT IS A SELF-GOVERNMENT AGREEMENT?

A Self-Government Agreement (SGA) is a nationto-nation agreement with Canada that recognizes Sts'ailes rights for self-government. It will outline key elements of our self-government practices and future scope of work we wish to engage in for selfgovernment.

Decision-Making

Essentially, the SGA recognizes decision-making power of indigenous governments - in this case, for Sts'ailes.

INDIAN ACT & SELF-GOVERNMENT

Under the Indian Act

- ^o Governed by the Indian Act
- ^o Band Council has delegated authorities
- ^o Band Council reports to the Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations and Minister of Indigenous Services
- ^o Programs and services provided through Department of Indigenous Services

- Land that is provided (Indian Reserves) for the use and benefit of the Band cannot be owned by the Band orindividual members.
- Funding is determined by the federal government and there is no guarantee in funding

Under Self-Governance

- The Indian Act no longer applies to the First Nation or it's Citizens where the First Nation have made their own laws.
 - » Sts'ailes is an independent government
 - » Sts'ailes is no longer accountable to the Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations and Indigenous Services
- Governed by Sts'ailes Constitution
 - » Sts'ailes Government makes laws and is accountable to the people
- Same level of existing services plus ability to expand When the Constitution and Citizenship Codeare ratified services to meet the needs of its citizens and when the Self-Government Agreement (SGA) is signed, we can expect tofollow the standards and practices outlinedin these governing documents. We **Collaborative Fiscal Framework** will have a better idea of what the detailed changes will be when we begin implementation planning. These plans will also be shared with Sts'ailes Xwelmexw.

STS'AILES EDUCATION DEPARTMENT **UPDATE**

Sts'ailes Education is honored to welcome back all our school families and especially our new families to the 2023-2024 school term.

There are a lot of new initiatives taking place at the daycare, school and post secondary.

The daycare families will be enjoying three new playground areas with absorbent surfaces, shade space and wonderful play structures.

The centre will also be receiving new heating and roofing for the two outbuildings.

Sts'ailes Community School had a complete heating system replacement and will now enjoy air conditioning throughout the school. The two boiler systems were removed and replaced with fuel efficient systems.

Students will also be able to learn and enjoy developing apprenticeship skills in the new Industrial Ed shop that will feature teaching areas in electical, plumbing and carpentry. There will also be a learning classroom that will host all the extracurricular skills training that provides students with valuable certification in a number of areas.

Transportation is also receiving a significant upgrade. The school has purchased three fully electric buses that will be on the road this December, two seventy two passenger buses will arrivce this school year while an eighty four passenger bus will arrive for the 2024-2025 school term. This is exciting news as the school moves to reduce emissions and reduce fuel and maintenance costs.

Sts'ailes Education continues it's positive working relationship with SD78. With fifty students attending AESS/Kent it is important that our families have the opportunity to be informed of the successes of students. This information will become part of the newsletters through quarterly updates from SD78.

We look forward to working with our school families to provide an amazing learning experience for all students. If you require further information please contact the office.



IMPORTANT STATUS CARD INFORMATION

Many Sts'ailes members have been coming in to apply for their Secure Certificate of Indian Status (SCIS) cards along with other band members who live in Sts'ailes.

All registered status members are encouraged to apply for the SCIS card due to its security features.

Note: Sts'ailes Indian Registration Administrator no longer does the laminated Certificate of Indian Status (CIS) cards.

If your status card is expired or going to expire in 6 months, it is best to apply for the SCIS card right now. The processing time from the date the completed application is received in Gatineau, Quebec to you receiving the SCIS card in the mail is 8 - 14 weeks.

To apply for the SCIS card you will need:

- 2 Canadian passport pictures
- 1 valid/current government issued picture ID such as a driver's licence, BC Services card or BC Identity (BCID) card

The Band Change Report is issued monthly showing the following:

- Names of new Sts'ailes members added to our Band List
- Names of Sts'ailes members who have transferred out, passed away and have been removed from our Band List
- Total Population Before
- Total Population After

These monthly reports are posted for three (3) years and are in a binder located at the Administration front desk.



We no longer do laminated Status Cards.



Provides employment services to under/un-employed Indigenous people who are status, non-status, on/off reserve and who reside in our catchment area. Within SASET's catchment area there are 31 First Nations.

Indigenous individuals can access services from any employment services location in the catchment area.

All SASET employment counsellors have their Career Development Practitioner Certification, workshop facilitation skills, essential skills assessment certification and can assist clients with the following:

- individualized workplans to develop their essential skills for success in training and employment.
- ° identify barriers to employment and assist with creating an action plan to overcome barriers of attaining employment.
- ^o assist individuals with career exploration and decision making.
- ^o job search, resume/cover letter and interview skills.
- ^o one to one or group employability workshops.
- ^o applying for short and long-term training funding and transition to work supports.
- works with community income assistance staff to assist 'employables' with an action plan to employment.

TRAINING AND SUPPORT

The SASET Employment Counselors who assist in delivery of employment services at Employment Assistance Services offices meet with Indigenous under/un-employed individuals (at SAS ET Outreach Offices and/or full-time employment centers located at Sto:lo, Seabird and Sts'ailes), who will assist individuals with skills assessments and development, application completion to training

programs and will ensure all needed supports are in place for individuals to move forward to training with employment results.

Skills Development funding is geared towards providing financial assistance for people in need of specific training to further their career goals to retain sustainable employment.

Transition to Work Supports: assists individuals in need when receiving employment who may require; safety equipment, uniforms, transportation until first pay cheque, etc.

Short Term Training: up to 30 days of skills training towards employment

Long Term Training: up to one year of training supports, to a maximum of \$10,000.00 per applicant. SASET often partners with WorkBC, First Nations Post-Secondary Education Administrators, etc to co-sponsor individuals, which will lead to employment success.

***Please note: safety equipment is also funded during applied training where required and is not included in these numbers.





